How will their newly-formed communities react to these events?

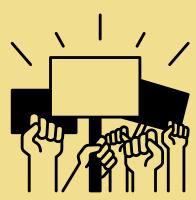
How will they stand up for themselves? Will they choose to strike? To march? Or to take some other action?

Learning Objectives:

- To know some of the ways different communities can express culture.
- To reflect why culture is important and/or how this can make you feel.
- To consider how cultural exchange can be met with positive and negative responses.
- To understand how negative responses to a culture can impact on how communities may feel and potentially act.
- To know some different acts of resistance to discrimination and general reasons for choosing them.
- To know about some real examples of discrimination and resistance in Southall during the 60s & 70s
